## Sacramento Habitat enters the Final Phase of Indian Lane



I t was nearly a decade ago when planning first began for Sacramento Habitat's ambitious Indian Lane project— a transitoriented, LEED development which would feature 14-single family homes for Habitat families.

After acquiring the land in 2006 for roughly \$25,000 through the city's negotiated tax lien sale program, it would take Sacramento Habitat several years to raise the necessary sponsorship funds to actually start building. In 2011, after a successful capitol campaign, Sacramento Habitat finally broke ground on the infrastructure. Says CEO Ken Cross, "After spending over 6 years of planning, raising money, grant funding, and working with the city...[walking the newly paved streets] gave me goose bumps."

This year, Sacramento Habitat will enter the final phase of Indian Lane and complete the remaining 5 homes of the 14 unit development.

The project, says Sacramento Habitat, has been a true community effort with sponsorship funding coming from everywhere from banks to law offices to churches. As for the labor, since home construction began in 2013, the project has hosted close to 2,000 volunteers who have put in over 26,000 hours helping on the project.

Sacramento Habitat is still looking for home sponsors for 2 of the remaining 5 homes on Indian Lane.

#### CEO CORNER with Ken Cross



Sacramento Habitat for Humanity (SHfH) just completed our 29<sup>th</sup> year serving low-income families in the County of Sacramento.

A few 2014 highlights:

**Merger** – SHfH successfully merged with HFH, Yolo County. Our new name is *Habitat for Humanity of Greater Sacramento (HFHGS)*. Our service area will include both Sacramento and Yolo counties.

**Homes built** - Completed a record 13 homes in calendar year 2014. On Dec.  $5^{\text{th}}$ , we dedicated our 109<sup>th</sup> home built in Sacramento.

- **Global Mission** Hosted 3 Global Village Trips to Nicaragua with a total of 51 team members in 2014. Team donations and willing hands funded and built 5 homes for Nicaraguan families. Tithed from our unrestricted funds to build another 20 homes for a total of 25 Nicaraguan homes built in 2014. Our 25-year partnership with HFH Nicaragua has created homeownership for 242 families.
- **Families served** Our 38 homes built/families served worldwide in 2014 is a new affiliate record that allowed over 150 people to have the opportunity for a safe, decent place to live. Our 351 homes built worldwide in 29 years have given over a 1,000 children a "step up" to help break the cycle of poverty.
- **Volunteers** A record 2,500 plus volunteers and 112 groups provided almost 40,000 hours of volunteer labor working side-by-side with Habitat future homeowners to give them a "hand up, not a hand out" in achieving the American dream of homeownership.
- **Green building** HFHGS is continuing to build LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified homes with the US Green Building Council. To date we have built 21 LEED-certified homes with another 8 homes pending approval.
- **Indian Lane Project** The affiliate has completed 9 of our 14 LEED homes on Indian Lane. This project is a first for Sacramento as a LEED, transitoriented development (TOD) across the street from the Florin Road Light Rail Station, dense at almost 20 units per net acre and homeownership for families at 40%-60% of the area median income.
- **Stewardship** HFHGS continues to be a good steward of the donor dollars entrusted to us with an annual "unqualified audit" by our independent financial auditing firm of William & Olds CPAs. More than 88% of each donor dollar was spent on programs and services to help support our vision of "*A world where everyone has a decent place to live.*"
- On behalf of the HFH Greater Sacramento board of directors, staff and Habitat homeowner families, thank you for your continued support with your time, talent and treasure. Please know that you have significantly helped our mission of "Seeking to put God's love into action, Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope."



# More than just a House...

A recent survey shows the ripple effects of Sacramento Habitat homes on families and neighborhoods

For years, supporters of Sacramento Habitat for Humanity have noticed the positive ripple effects of Habitat for Humanity homes on the lives of the children who live in them and the neighborhoods where the houses are built, but recently Sacramento Habitat for Humanity was able to quantify those effects through surveying the first 100 families to receive Sacramento Habitat homes.

The results of the survey, which were later published in Habitat World Magazine, Habitat for Humanity International's Worldwide Publication, quantified what many have been seeing for years.

Since receiving their Habitat home...

- 76% of families with school-age children have seen an improvement in study habits and school
- 69% of families have had at least one family member start or complete higher education or job training programs
- 69% decrease in welfare and food stamp program usage.
- 57% of families have more savings
- 48% of families feel more connected to the community.



### You can't take it with you when you go -

DPR Employee leaves behind a Legacy for Single Mom and her two children



John Kramer, a 14-year DPR employee, may have passed away in September of 2013, but his legacy will forever live on through 2748 Oakmont Street—a new 3-bedroom Habitat home for single mom, Mizan Tsegay, and her two children.

In honor of their beloved colleague, a strong supporter of Habitat for Humanity, DPR has donated \$21,000 in Kramer's honor to partially sponsor Tsegay family's new home.

In addition to helping fund the project, DPR employees are also participating in what they are referring as "the John Kramer Memorial Build" by providing labor for the project as well.



Says Rodman Marquez, who is spearheading DPR's community

initiative efforts in the Sacramento region along with Megan Valles, "There's a pretty big, gratifying feeling you get from taking a sack of raw material and turning it into a wall that will be a home for someone to live in...Mizan has a lot of challenges as a single parent with a special needs child. She is very excited to be getting to move out of an apartment and into a home of her own."



From building the walls to various other stages of construction, DPR employees have been coming out strong to pay honor to the memory of their former colleague and help provide Mizan and her children with a safe, decent place to live.

Mizan and her children are currently living in a 1-bedroom apartment from which Mizan also runs a business as a hairdresser.



Mizan is especially excited for what the move from their over-crowded apartment to their Habitat home will mean for her daughter, Dena, who suffers from severe autism.



Says Mizan, "Dena wants to play, but in a small apartment it's hard. I'm so happy I'm going to own my home for my kids."

Mizan just recently completed her required 500 hours of sweat equity, no small feat for a single Mom raising two children and working full time.

The home, which Habitat has made special alterations on to ensure that it is a safe place for Dena, is expected to be complete this February with a dedication date TBD.

Sacramento Habitat planning 3 Global Village Trips to Nicaragua in 2015



In 2015, Sacramento Habitat will continue to expand on its tithe partnership with Hábitat para la Humanidad Nicaragua by hosting 3 more Global Village Trips.

Since 2012, has sent over 80 local volunteers to Nicaragua, Sacramento Habitat's sister tithe affiliate, to help build homes for families in need. According to CEO Ken Cross, interest in the Global Village Trip program, a 9-day build where volunteers provide both the labor and funding for the project, grows every year.

Says Cross, "Volunteers come home with a renewed sense of appreciation for life here in the States."

### Fix the Block, Fix the Neighborhood Sacramento Habitat rolls out its first Neighborhood Revitalization program with "A Brush with Kindness" in the Noralto Neighborhood



With disappearing State and Federal funding available due to the loss of Prop1C funding, Sacramento Habitat has been looking for creative ways to stretch resources and still serve as many families in need as possible.

According to Habitat CEO Ken Cross, the decision to start doing Neighborhood Revitalization was simple.

Says Cross, "I figured if you build one house and five fall down around it, are you really making any progress?"

Sacramento Habitat will be premiering its pilot "A Brush with Kindness" program in the Noralto neighborhood of Del Paso Heights in the coming months. The pilot project has been funded through a \$25,000 sponsorship provided by JPMorgan Chase who is also partially sponsoring two new

construction projects in the same neighborhood on Forrest Street.

The A Brush with Kindness program will include painting, light exterior repairs and landscaping for owner-occupied homes who fall within the income guidelines. Homeowners will pay only a percentage of the total cost of repairs on an income-based sliding scale.

A Brush with Kindness homeowner partners will also be required to perform a certain number of hours of sweat equity based on the scope of work being done on their homes. Says Cross, "This is still a hand up, not a hand out program, but this is giving us an opportunity to make a real difference in these neighborhoods for families who really need it."

Sacramento Habitat hopes to eventually garner the support to expand its Neighborhood Revitalization program to other focus areas including Yolo County, South Sacramento, and Oak Park. But that will take time and sponsorship.

# Sacramento Habitat to Celebrate 30th Anniversary this Summer

This September 11th, Sacramento Habitat for Humanity will be celebrating its 30th anniversary as a local affiliate of Habitat for Humanity International.

The affiliate, founded in 1985 by a dedicated group of volunteers, has come a long way from its humble roots of building 1-2 homes a year.

In March of 2013, the local Sacramento affiliate was 1 of 7 affiliates out of nearly 1,500 to be recognized as one of Habitat for Humanity International's "Affiliates of Distinction". A few months later, Sacramento Habitat completed its 100th home.

Then, in July of 2014, Sacramento Habitat went through its first merger with Habitat for Humanity, Yolo County and doubled its service area.

Says Sacramento Habitat Corporate Development, Officer Laine Himmelmann, "Sacramento Habitat may be small, but we've proved that we are mighty. I can't wait to see what will happen in the next 30 years."

#### When is the last time you "ReStore'd"? Sacramento Habitat for Humanity ReStore celebrates a record breaking year



If you haven't been to the Sacramento Habitat for Humanity ReStore before or it's been awhile since your last visit, it's time to stop by.

The ReStore, which sells new and used donated building supplies and furniture at 20-70% off retail, is located at 819 North 10th Street and is open to the public 9am-6pm Tuesday-Friday and 10am-5pm on Saturdays. Proceeds from the ReStore go towards building Habitat homes for families in need.

The ReStore, thanks to the valiant efforts of ReStore Manager Byron Watkins, Receiving Coordinator Jim Griffin, and the rest of the warehouse staff, had a record breaking year in sales for 2014.

Watkins attributes the success to the ReStore's surge in large corporate material donations and volunteer efforts. This past year, the ReStore received its largest donation to date via a 63,000 square foot warehouse of model home furniture which it will be slowly rolling onto the floor over the next few months. Additionally, ReStore volunteers put in over 6,000 hours in 2014 helping clean, organize, and assemble product - nearly a 40% increase from hours in 2013.



The ReStore hopes to bring in even more donations and volunteers in 2015.

Says Griffin, who works directly with the volunteers, "How successful we are in the ReStore really all depends on product donations and volunteers. The more donations and volunteers we get, the more homes we can help build for Habitat families."

#### What will YOU Build? Sacramento Habitat looking for Home Sponsors for 2015

It costs roughly \$170,000 to build a Habitat for Humanity home for a family in need. Almost half of that \$170,000 is raised through Home Sponsorship.

Says CEO Ken Cross, "Without Home Sponsorships, we wouldn't be able to build."

Sacramento Habitat is currently looking for organizations to help with home sponsorships for the coming year. Sponsorships can range from a mini home spon-

sorship of \$5,000 to a full home sponsorship of \$75,000.
